

## Trump Administration Health-Related Executive Orders Relevant for Children's Hospitals *(as of 1/24/2025)*

On Jan. 20, President Trump began his second term and has signed several Executive Orders (EOs) The chart below outlines which EOs children's health and hospitals should be aware of. We are continuing to monitor these EOs and will update this list periodically.

Memorandum	1/20/25	Regulatory Freeze Pending Review	This memorandum pauses the issuance, publication and enforcement of new federal rules pending review by department or agency heads appointed by the incoming administration. It instructs agencies to withdraw unpublished rules from the <i>Federal Register</i> and delay the effective dates of recently published or issued rules for 60 days to evaluate their legal, factual and policy implications. During this period, agencies may open a comment period for public feedback and consider further delays if necessary. EO	1/20/25	Initial Rescissions of Harmful Executive Orders and Actions	This EO revokes 78 executive actions from the previous administration, including those related to Medicaid, Medicare, the Affordable Care Act (ACA), COVID-19 policies, and diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI). It led some states to lengthen enrollment periods and provide more funding to help residents sign up for coverage.</p> <p><b>Executive Order 14087: Lowering Prescription Drug Costs for Americans.</b> This EO addressed prescription drug affordability through the work of the CMMI. As a result of this EO, C MMI developed the Cell and Gene Therapy Access Model, the Medicare High-Value Drug List Model, and the Accelerating Clinical Evidence Model.</p> <p><b>Executive Order 14110: Safe, Secure, and Trustworthy Development and Use of Artificial Intelligence (AI).</b> The order sought to establish responsible AI practices across multiple agencies, including the HHS, such as safety testing prior to public release, algorithm bias, nondiscrimination, safeguards on the use of individuals' data during large-scale model training and mitigation of automation's impact on workforces.</p> <p><b>Various COVID-19 EOs.</b> Several Biden policies aimed at tackling the Covid-19 pandemic and preparing the country for future infectious disease outbreaks were revoked. 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EO	1/20/25	Withdrawing the United States from the World Health Organization	This EO declares that the United States intends to withdraw from the World Health Organization (WHO). It directs the secretary of State and the director of the Office of Management and Budget to pause the future transfer of any U.S. government funds, support or resources to the WHO, recall and reassign U.S. government personnel or contractors working in any capacity with the WHO and identify credible and transparent U.S. and international partners to assume necessary activities previously undertaken by the WHO. The secretary of State will immediately inform the United Nations of the WHO withdrawal and cease negotiations on the WHO pandemic agreements and amendments to the international health regulations. It also orders the director of the White House Office of Pandemic Preparedness and Response Policy to review, rescind and replace the 2024 U.S. Global Health Security Strategy. It directs the assistant to the president for national security affairs to establish directorates and coordinating mechanisms within the National Security Council to safeguard public health and fortify biosecurity.	13987	<a href="#">Withdrawing The United States From The World Health Organization – The White House</a>	Health Care, International Relations
EO	1/20/25	Protecting the Meaning and Value of American Citizenship	This EO rescinds the principle of birthright citizenship for any individuals born in the country when their father was not a legal resident of the United States and their mother was either in the country lawfully but temporarily, or was unlawfully present. Under this EO, no federal agency or department will issue or accept citizenship documentation given under the above conditions. 			EO will only apply to individuals born 30 days after its issuance.			
EO	1/20/25	Defending Women from Gender Ideology Extremism and Restoring Biological Truth to the Federal Government	This EO declares it the policy of the United States to recognize two biological sexes, male and female, and to ensure that federal policies, laws and actions are based on this rather than concepts of gender identity. It directs federal agencies to enforce all sex-based rights, protections and accommodations using definitions set forth in the order, including clarifying that “sex” refers to an individual’s biological classification and is not interchangeable with “gender identity.” The order prohibits federal funds from being used to support gender ideology, mandates the revision of agency policies, forms and communications to align with its definitions and requires government-issued identification documents to reflect biological sex. The attorney general, in consultation with other federal agencies, is tasked with providing guidance, rescinding previous policies inconsistent with the order and correcting the application of the <i>Bostock v. Clayton County</i> decision. Memorandum	1/20/25	Delivering Emergency Price Relief for American Families and Defeating the Cost-of-Living Crisis	This memorandum orders the heads of all executive departments and agencies to lower the cost of housing and expand housing supply, eliminate requirements that increase the cost of home appliances and rescind climate policies. EO	1/20/25	Ending Racial and Wasteful Government DEI Programs and Preferencing	This EO declares it the policy of the United States to terminate all federal programs, policies and mandates related to diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI), diversity, equity, inclusion and accessibility (DEIA) and environmental justice, asserting they are discriminatory and wasteful. It directs the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) and the attorney general to oversee the review, revision and elimination of such programs, including DEI offices, positions like chief diversity officers, equity action plans and related grants or contracts. Federal employment practices must prioritize individual merit and hard work, excluding any DEI or DEIA considerations. 			<p>constitutional values. It prohibits hiring decisions based on impermissible factors like race, sex or religion and emphasizes efficiency, accountability and transparency. The plan includes measures to reduce hiring times to under 80 days, integrate advanced technology for recruitment and improve communication with candidates regarding application status. EO	1/23/25	Removing Barriers to American Leadership in Artificial Intelligence	<p>This EO is the first focused specifically on AI, formally moving away from the Biden administration's approach to regulating the technology. The EO calls for an interagency group to develop the administration's new policy on AI within six months. The interagency group includes the Assistant to the President for Science and Technology (APST), the Special Advisor for AI and Crypto and the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs (APNSA), to work in coordination with the Assistant to the President for Economic Policy, the Assistant to the President for Domestic Policy, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB Director) and the heads of relevant agencies.
